(1803) The great reforms introduced by Philippe Pinel at Bicetre in 1793 augured the beginning of a new approach. Pinel ascribed the "sick role," and called for compassion and help. One does not need to know much about those he wants to hurt, but one must know a lot in order to help. Pinel's reform was followed by a rapid development in research of causes, symptoms, and remedies of mental disorders. There are two main prerequisites for planning a treatment strategy.
