**A History of Roget's Thesaurus : Origins, Development, and Design** Nov 04 2022

The author examines the manner and method of its compilation, the practical outcomes of the traditions on which it was based, and the ways in which the *Thesaurus* reflects and reveals Roget's beliefs and background.
